Thought for the month

Didn't you used to be dead?

I've been reading a book called *Cuddy* by Benjamin Myers. It's a novel but includes factual information and quotes from other authors about the life of St Cuthbert. I used to live in the north-east so it's close to my heart. Cuthbert's body is now in Durham Cathedral, which was built as his final resting place. There's much in the novel about cathedral building in pre-Health and Safety times. Well dodgy!

The pilgrims who took the body from Lindisfarne (fleeing Vikings) are portrayed as people with a question – where should such a saint as Cuthbert reside?

And the book raises more questions:

- Do we need places of pilgrimage? Why?
- Does a mission make you a Christian?
- How are visions and words from God to be interpreted?

These are more discussion-starters than answerable questions...

The Hebrew Scriptures contain a story of a man called Job who suffered greatly. For thirty seven chapters he questions God about his pain, whilst listening to the dodgy advice of human comforters. Eventually he shuts up and listens. God asks some questions back which Job can't answer. He ends up saying, 'I have talked about things that are far beyond my understanding.' Job learnt through questioning. Not through getting answers.

As a Christian Minister I have heard many questions about church, about God, about life. I have some myself and I feel the church I attend is a reasonably safe place to raise them. All churches should have signs over the door (even if only **imaginary**) saying 'Questioners always welcome.'

You will read this around Easter when questions about Jesus are many. St Cuthbert is still dead. Jesus? Not so much.

Called to be fools

April Fool's Day is the traditional way to begin this month. In medieval times the fool (or jester) was not just there for amusement – he had an influential role in the court because he could speak the truth in ways others couldn't. As Christians, we are also called to be fools: Paul described himself as a 'fool for Christ' (1 Corinthians 4:10). How is this an appropriate description of a Christian? In his letter to the Corinthians Paul expands on this theme.

A foolish message: 'For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God' (1 Corinthians 1:18). The heart of the Gospel does not focus on clever ideas but on the Cross of Jesus Christ. This message of foolishness and weakness is both God's wisdom and power for our lives.

A foolish community: 'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong' (1 Corinthians 1:27). The church in Corinth consisted of slaves rather than the rich and successful. God calls the weak and vulnerable to follow Him, in order to shame those who think they don't need God.

A foolish ministry: 'My message and my preaching were not with wise and persuasive words, but with a demonstration of the Spirit's power, so that your faith might not rest on human wisdom, but on God's power' (1 Corinthians 2:4-5). Paul's ministry didn't rest on human wisdom but on the power of the Holy Spirit. For us, this power is often displayed when we are at our weakest.

Leviticus and Numbers: what's the big idea?

The books of Leviticus and Numbers are concerned with Israel's wandering in the desert; their journey from slavery in Egypt to the promised land of Canaan.

Leviticus focuses on the regulations about worship, ceremonial cleanness, moral laws and holy days. The key theme is that of *holiness* as every detail of our lives is affected by the presence of a holy God. The aim of the sacrifices, feasts and **Sabbaths was to enable the people to enter God's presence. We should see the** instructions and practices in Leviticus as pointing to Jesus who, as Easter reminds us, totally fulfilled the law through the sacrifice of His life. He demonstrated the love and holiness of God, so that we can share His life, *'Be holy, because I am holy'* (*1 Peter 1:16, cf Leviticus 11:44-45, 19:2, 20:7*).

The book of Numbers tells the story of Israel's journey through the wilderness. The people were coming to terms with their identity as God's people and the call to serve Him. They didn't always respond with faith, gratitude and obedience, but with unbelief, ingratitude and rebellion. As a result of their refusal to enter Canaan (*Numbers 14:1-45*), they were condemned to spend the rest of their lives in the desert. However, God in His grace allowed their children to enter the Promised Land. The book reminds us that the Church is called to be a community that honours God, learns how to deal with sin in ourselves and others, and lives out love and justice in daily life.

'The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face shine upon you and be gracious to you; the Lord turn his face toward you and give you peace' (Numbers 6:24-26).

Don't be afraid of clouds

Have you ever sat and watched the clouds drift by? Some of them are vast, towering up and up into the sky, and can seem intimidating.

There can be clouds of discouragement and suffering in our lives as well, circumstances that temporarily blot out the sunlight of God's love for us. You may have such a cloud hanging over your life right now. You may be in a hospital bed, or suffering discouragement, fear, despair or bereavement.

Have you ever noticed that sometimes when you board a plane the sky is like a thick grey ceiling? It looks impenetrable. But the plane does not hesitate – it climbs steadily onward and upward straight into the cloud. And what happens? Nothing! The cloud cannot block your progress, it must give way before you.

The simple truth is, you may not be able to *see* through clouds but you *can go through them.* The plane uses navigational aids for guidance and we have the Holy Spirit to guide us through the darkest times. And finally, we emerge through the cloudbank and there before us is a sun-drenched sky of blue and golden glory, far above the dismal and disappointing things below.

Whatever cloud is hanging over you, whether suffering, discouragement or fear, there IS something you can do about it NOW. Pray – pour out your heart to the Lord about it. He has promised that His grace will be sufficient for anything we encounter in this life.

And look up. Look towards heaven, think beyond those clouds, and remember His promise that the sufferings we may be undergoing here are nothing compared to the glory that God has prepared for us there.

The Bible assures us, 'The Lord God is a sun and shield: the Lord will give grace and glory: no good thing will He withhold from those who walk uprightly. O Lord Almighty, blessed is the man that trusts in you' (Psalm 84:11-12).

The meaning of colours

Between February and May this year the coloured frontal of the altar will have been changed many times, as will the colour of the priest's vestments. Each colour (and there can be as many as six in a church's store) has a different meaning. They reflect the significance of that day or the season.

In February and March, purple was used as a symbol of penitence as we were in Lent and trying to prepare ourselves for Christ's final act of love for each of us.

Holy Week, the time of Christ's final journey, was denoted by the colour red. Red, the colour of blood, is used for feasts of martyrs as well as those for the Holy Spirit – when it more likely represents his flames of 'fire' which rested on those in the Upper Room.

On Maundy Thursday, we switched to white for any Communion service, as this celebrates the remembrance of the first Communion with His apostles which He commanded us to continue. On Good Friday, we were back to red again.

Then on Easter Sunday, the day of the greatest Christian celebration, we entered to an altar bedecked in gold or the 'whitest' with the most elaborate decoration the church possesses.

'Plain' white will be used for the Easter season, signifying purity and Christ's triumph over death, until Ascension Day on 9th May. This, being a special and more significant day in the life, death and resurrection of Christ, goes to gold again: then immediately back to white for the next ten days.

On the day of Pentecost itself, Whit Sunday, 19th May, the colour will be? Yes, you got it: red for flames of fire. Pentecost was, and remains, a Jewish festival. At the time of Jesus, it was a joyful celebration of the first fruits of the harvest, which was why all the apostles were gathered together in Jerusalem, as was expected of all Jewish men.

As the apostles gathered following Jesus' Ascension, the Holy Spirit came upon them. This is what Christians celebrate at Pentecost, and therefore the colour is red. The following day the colour changes to green, and remains green until the Feast of All Saints' at the end of October, which will be white.

Next time you're in church, take a look at the altar and see what colour it is wearing.

Why a church should always resist change...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

I am not surprised you have got yourself into trouble; innovation is never to be encouraged. New ideas tend to cause revolutions. The move from incandescent light bulbs to energy-saving ones may ultimately change the Church of England.

Change is something everyone claims to be in favour of – provided it has no measurable effect on their own lives. I remember as a young curate once suggesting that at the Harvest Supper, tables might be enlarged so eight people could sit together rather than the traditional six, thus helping more people get to know one another. I was firmly told that tables for six had been perfectly **adequate for parishioners in Queen Victoria's day. For the rest of my curacy I** was regarded as a revolutionary, to be watched carefully.

So, your suggestion that our 11am Mattins might be moved to 10.30am, to encourage those who wanted to have more of the day free to themselves, certainly lobbed a hand grenade among the post-Service coffee cups. The only person who was mildly in favour was Colonel Wainwright, who quickly realised that it would give him an extra half-hour at the gin and tonics before lunch.

Should you ever feel that people lack imagination, you should watch them in action when they find reasons for resisting an unwelcome suggestion. One said the time couldn't be moved, since it would then be too early for the local bus – omitting to mention that none of our congregation travel to church by bus and the service doesn't run on Sundays anyway. Another pointed out that it would confuse those who didn't attend church – not explaining why, if they never attended, it mattered what time the Service was. A third, rather touchingly, mentioned that it wouldn't give the rector time to enjoy his breakfast after the rigours of the 8am Service.

Your suggestion did serve one useful purpose; it brought our congregation together in united opposition. They may not necessarily always know what they are for, but they certainly know what they are against. For that, I thank you. Your loving uncle, Eustace
