

Walking into Creation

The summer months offer us more chances to enjoy walking in the local area and on holidays further afield. As I write this, I am inspired by Dave Foster from Harvington who is halfway through his walk across England and Wales from Lowestoft to St Davids in aid of the *ShelterBoots* appeal. He reports that he's already raised over £4,000 – enough to fund seven Shelterboxes. A Shelterbox provides emergency shelter and tools to support families overwhelmed by disaster. Many of you may be taking part in the ARCH Benefice walk at the end of June from Abbots Morton to Harvington. We live in a beautiful part of the world and being able to walk slowly, taking in each new vista, is a great way to connect with our created world. In our many bible stories, walking was a natural way of getting around, and some of the most significant events took place on walks. Jesus walked in many places and those fortunate to have visited the Holy Land are able to walk, quite literally, in Jesus' footsteps.

Some of you, including Revd Richard, have taken time to embark on pilgrimages. Pilgrimage is about journey; a physical journey involving some effort, individually or in a group, and a spiritual journey. It is something you can do from home, visiting local churches, monuments, natural beauties like ancient yew trees, sources of water and walking along natural paths trod for centuries. There are many places of pilgrimage in our Diocese of Worcester and pilgrimage walking routes (one of which starts from Church Lench) are available on the Diocese website at www.cofe-worcester.org.uk/walkthecross.

As the Celtic prayer says, 'May the road rise to meet you, may the wind be ever at your back, may the sun shine warm upon your face, and the rain fall soft upon your fields.' Enjoy your walk!

Christianity – a course exploring its faith and life

The Being With course is an introduction to Christianity with a difference! Instead of a Bible study or a series of arguments to try to convince you that God exists, it starts with the conviction that you already have a wealth of understanding of truth, beauty and goodness that will help you, in the company of others, recognise God's presence in your life and your everyday experiences.



At the heart of the course is the idea that God's greatest desire is to be with us in Jesus. That's the reason the world was created; that's why you were created.

Over a period of ten sessions you will discover the dimensions of this presence and what it means to live abundantly with God, with one another and with creation.

This course will start in September, meeting either during the day or in the evening, and will comprise a small group of up to 8 people. Mary Magdalene

Six Marys are mentioned in the New Testament, including Mary Magdalene who is remembered in the church's calendar on 22nd July. What can we learn from Mary's story?

We don't have to be defined by our past: when Jesus encountered Mary, He cast seven demons out of her (Luke 8:2). As a result, her life was transformed and she became a follower of Jesus. Her life as a disciple was no longer defined by the person she had been before. Like Mary, we don't have to let our past without Christ dictate how we see ourselves today.

Put Jesus at the centre of our world: along with some of the women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases (Luke 8:1-3), Mary followed Jesus and His disciples and supported them in ministry. She was there at the cross (Matthew 27:55-56) and was one of the first to the tomb on the Sunday (Matthew 28:1, Mark 16:1 and John 20:1-18). Like Mary, we are called to serve Jesus as dedicated disciples.

Jesus uses the weakest in the world: Mary is a great example of Paul's words, 'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong' (1 Corinthians 1:27). At a time when women were regarded as second-class citizens with no real autonomy, Jesus had a special compassion and care for women. Alongside Mary, the women's witness to the resurrection was taken seriously.

We should be careful not to dismiss things that don't follow our expectations, because Jesus doesn't always do what we expect! He delights in working out His plans through unlikely people and in surprising ways. He did this through Mary and, if we let Him, He can do it through us!

Working from rest

The summer sees many of us taking holidays to get some well-earned rest from working. But what is the biblical relationship between rest and work? The Bible shows us that we are to work from rest, not rest from work. How is this working out in our current experience?



When God created human beings on the sixth day, the next full day was a day of rest before the work began. 'Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it He rested from all the work of creating that He had done' (Genesis 2:3). Sunday is a day of rest at the beginning of the week.

Jesus lived out this rhythm of rest and work in His own ministry. 'Very early in the morning, Jesus got up and went off to a solitary place, where He prayed.' He then told His disciples, 'Let us go somewhere else so I can preach there also. That is why I have come' (Mark 1:35-38).

Here is a rhythm for our own lives. 'I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in Me and I in you, you will bear much fruit' (John 15:5). Our work, our fruitfulness arises out of the time we abide/rest in Jesus. He will then show us what aspects of our lives need pruning; 'while every branch that does bear fruit He prunes so that it will be even more fruitful' (John 15:2).

Let's use the summer to reflect on how this pattern is working in our lives:

- Are we spending enough time 'abiding' in Jesus?
- Are we putting our energies into the right balance of rest and work?
- Are there unproductive areas of our lives and churches that need pruning?

Remember, God created us as human beings not just human doings!!

On holiday with Jesus

August is the month when schools are off and many of us go on holiday. Some may travel to far-away exotic destinations while others may opt for a staycation. Whichever you choose, the good news is that Jesus offers us a true rest:



'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls' (Matthew 11: 28-29). Are you feeling tired or burdened and in need of a holiday? Jesus invites you to spend it with Him!

The invitation: Our holiday destination is Jesus Himself: 'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened...' We can come just as we are, with all the burdens and sadness we carry. Jesus doesn't offer a 'quick fix' to deal with our issues; He simply offers Himself!

The promise: Jesus promises us the gift of refreshing, sustaining and everlasting rest. When we go on holiday, we usually look forward to doing very little, yet this is not the kind of rest Jesus offers. His rest involves taking up His yoke and learning from Him! A yoke was the wooden collar that ran across the shoulders of a pair of oxen to enable them to work the fields. Jesus is saying 'My yokes fit well. They do not rub your neck and shoulders. Come to Me and get yoked to Me. Make an act of loyal obedience and trust in Me and you will find a deep peace and satisfaction that you could never find anywhere else. I have come for you!'

What's so amazing about this holiday is that you can get rest by simply staying at home!

Why we don't bother to lock the church...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

Since I happened to be in your area last week, I tried to call in at your church and was sorry to find it was locked and bolted, with surveillance cameras watching me.

We tend to be a little more relaxed about matters of security. The key to the medieval lock was lost some time during Queen Victoria's reign and never replaced. How someone managed to misplace a foot-long piece of cast iron, weighing about 10lbs, is a mystery. If it had fallen out of someone's pocket, it would certainly have broken their foot. Ever since, no one has bothered with locking the door – which makes me wish our burglars last year had thought of trying it, before wasting so much energy smashing a stained-glass window when they visited in the early hours one morning. On the other hand, were the key still in use, I should probably be arrested for carrying an offensive weapon.

As with most rural churches, keys which open just about everything in the village are hidden in various parts of the church. The vestry key is under my seat cushion, the organ key under a vase on the altar, the church hall key on top of the hymn book cupboard, and Miss Simpson's spare front door key inside the font. I am sure someone could usefully produce a book suggesting the many places keys are likely to be secreted in churches for the use of vergers, flower arrangers, cleaners – and thieves wanting to save themselves time and effort.

I suspect the burdened look that many urban clergy wear is not because they are weighed down with parish troubles but because they are obliged to carry a superfluity of keys needed to negotiate every door in the church, hall, school and vicarage. And there is always one which no one has any idea what it opens!

The only occasion I have ever thought it would be useful to be able to lock a church is when you have a party of visitors inside. So often, on hearing the words 'let us pray' or the start of an appeal for funds, they bolt for the door.
