Thought for the month

Light in the darkness

I had a strange and disconcerting experience in church the other day. At our Christingle service, we found that we had more people than candles so I gave mine away. As the electric lights dimmed, the Christingles candles were lit and everywhere had little points of light in the darkness; everywhere except my corner which stayed dark. Lights all over the church but my light was missing.

There is difficult news every day at the moment, whether it is wars in Ukraine or the Middle East, or acts of violence nearer home. Sometimes it feels overwhelming. And yet, amongst the horror and hatred of the war in Israel/Gaza, I have heard stories which show there can still be hope amid the despair; light in the darkness.

Some Israelis have, for many years, been driving Palestinians needing specialist hospital treatment into Israel from Gaza and the West Bank – this has continued in the West Bank even after 7th October. And a group of schools called Hand in Hand, founded in 1997, integrates education for Palestinian and Israeli children. They learn and play together; they are taught in Hebrew and Arabic; they learn to understand each other's culture, beliefs and experience. Even in these dark times, the schools are a safe place where deep discussions can take place across an almost unbridgeable divide. They provide light in the darkness.

Today in Pershore Abbey, a group of first school children led us in worship with a discussion about prayer and led us in singing the old song, *This Little Light of Mine*. It reminded me of the darkness surrounding me when my Christingle candle was missing. For things to change for the better, we all need to act in whatever way we can to help. And it works! Last Christmas in Harvington, many of us were moved in various ways to help a young homeless man. As a result, he was discovered to be a missing person and reunited with his family.

In the darkest of circumstances, the light of one or two individuals can shine brightly.

Looking for the Resurrection

A couple are driving down the motorway when the wife gets a call from their daughter. 'Mum, there's a car driving the wrong way down the motorway!' The wife warns her husband that there is a lunatic on the motorway. Her husband, clutching the wheel in terror, replies: 'One lunatic? There are dozens of them, all headed straight for us!' What we see is determined by our perspective on life.

In the Nicene Creed we say, 'We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.' In the gospel accounts of the Resurrection, there is a lot of looking and seeing. Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome went early to the tomb. They saw the stone rolled aside and inside the tomb a young man dressed in white said to them, 'Don't be alarmed. You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid Him...He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see Him' (Mark 16:6-7).

Like the women, we would probably have been left 'trembling and bewildered' if we had been there that morning. Had the body been taken? Was the young man an angel or deceiver? Had Jesus been raised to life again, or was this an elaborate hoax?

Easter gives us a choice. We can approach life looking for disappointment, fear and despair. Or we can look for resurrection and not just find an empty tomb but encounter the living Christ. He continues to meet us in our daily lives bringing new hope, forgiveness of sin, healing and wholeness, and the assurance of His presence through the darkest of times. God invites us to see our lives differently and look for Christ's resurrection at work in our lives and the people around us.

Why we should be like donkeys

Are you a pet-lover? Many people own a dog, a cat or a budgie but few of us own a donkey! Yet in Biblical times, donkeys were essential to daily life. They did everything from ploughing and helping to grind corn to carrying people and transporting their belongings. Despite their small frame, donkeys are surprisingly tough. They can survive on poor fodder and can travel an average of 20 miles a day.

There are two occasions in the Christian calendar where donkeys walk into the picture. At Christmas, Mary travelled the 100 miles from Nazareth to Bethlehem on a donkey. And although a donkey doesn't get a specific mention in the manger story, that same one who transported Mary was probably there – where else would it have been?

On Palm Sunday, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey. Jesus deliberately chose this animal rather than a horse. Why? In Biblical times, the horse was associated with war, conquest and worldly might but the donkey was a symbol of peace and humility. So Jesus used this animal to show that He had come with the dignity of the King of Peace. His entry into the Holy City also fulfilled Zechariah's prophecy concerning the Messiah.

Donkeys are hardworking and undemanding. They wait for their master to put them to the work He has chosen for them. And, remarkably, each one bears the mark of the Cross on their backs!

Perhaps that is something we should learn – to wait for Jesus our Master, to be always obedient to Him, to serve Him with all our hearts and to bear the mark of His grace in our lives.

Wake up call

A mother was complaining to her neighbour just how hard it was to get her teenagers out of bed in the morning. The neighbour replied that she never had any trouble with her son. 'I just open the door and let the cat into the room,' she explained. The mother was puzzled, and asked how that might help. 'Easy. The dog sleeps on my son's bed.'

Exodus: what's the big idea?

This month we are looking at Exodus, the second book of the Old Testament. Its name means 'departure', reminding us that Israel's flight out of slavery in Egypt is the major focus of the book.

Exodus is a book of two halves! The first (chapters 1-19 and 32-34) is the story of an oppressed people who are delivered from slavery into a life of freedom. The second half (chapters 20-31 and 35-40) consists of detailed instructions about the life and worship of God's people. The book introduces us to their *salvation* or deliverance, as *story*. God's promises to Abraham are fulfilled as the people journey to the Promised Land. He also renews His covenant with them at Sinai, expressed in the Ten Commandments (*Exodus 20:1-17*).

At the heart of Exodus is the person of God Himself. In chapter 3, God reveals His name as YHWH or 'I am who I am' to Moses (Exodus 3:14). This is the name by which God is known throughout the Old Testament, expressed in the title 'the LORD'. To know God's name is to know Him, as well as His character: His justice, truthfulness, mercy, faithfulness and holiness. He is the God who controls history, delivering the people out of Egypt, while the death of the Passover lamb points us to Jesus' death on the cross (1 Corinthians 5:7).

God's promises of help remain true for us today. 'Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the LORD will bring you today' (Exodus 14:13).

As Eugene Peterson said, 'This Exodus story continues to be a major means that God uses to draw men and women in trouble out of the mess of history into the kingdom of salvation.'

Mothering Sunday

Mothering Sunday is a day of mixed emotions. For many it's a happy, joyous day but for others it's one of pain and grief. A day to celebrate love while acknowledging those who cannot have children or have lost them and those who have no relationship with their mother.

In the dying moments of His life, Jesus honoured Mary his mother by showing her love and care. He entrusted His mother to John's protection, 'When Jesus saw His mother there, and the disciple whom He loved standing nearby, He said to her, "Woman, here is your son," and to the disciple, "Here is your mother." From that time on, this disciple took her into his home' (John 19:26-27). While affirming the importance of mothers, Jesus reminds us that the love we show on Mothering Sunday is just a token of our continuous appreciation of them.

Jesus also created a new way of being family, marking the beginnings of the church. In the past, people would go back to their mother church on this Sunday, to acknowledge its importance in their lives. Jesus invites us into this new family of love and mutual belonging where we can find a place, irrespective of our own family circumstances.

Church is not always an easy place to be, because we are shaped by our own experience of mothering. We may find it hard to give or receive love without ourselves getting in the way. However, God's help is available to change things, 'because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us' (Romans 5:5).

Why pews SHOULD be uncomfortable...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

Visits from your parishioners to our church are always welcome, but I did not expect them to return to you complaining because our pews are uncomfortable.

Pews are *meant* to be uncomfortable. The unshakeable belief of our congregation is that the more uncomfortable the pew, the holier the worship must be. By the same token, an 8am Service is more fervent than one at 11am since it is much more socially inconvenient. If you add on enduring sub-zero temperatures and damp then sainthood clearly beckons.

Our pews were built 500 years ago, when people were several inches shorter and many pounds lighter and could accommodate themselves on the pews perfectly adequately. The fact that a 21st-century body is in constant danger of sliding off the seat and requires knees to be folded somewhere near the ears at least helps to keep minds focused – apart from Colonel Wainwright, who still manages to sleep peacefully throughout Mattins every Sunday.

I could point out that your chairs make kneeling almost impossible, although I suspect that posture is not encouraged in your church as people would then be unable to read the words on your overhead projector or wave their arms about during the hymns. While the majority of our congregation find the Anglican crouch perfectly adequate, you can see those who flop to their knees on hearing 'let us pray' from the clouds of dust sent up from suddenly compressed hassocks, which were purchased to commemorate Queen Victoria's Accession.

I may also point out that our box pews are very useful for modern times. Once a family is seated and the door firmly shut, any toddler is penned in and unable to use the aisles as a racing circuit.

If only you would remove your chairs and substitute benches without backs, turn off all heating and replace carpets with slate slabs, I am sure your congregation's religious zeal would soar.

Free energy home improvements now available to residents in Worcestershire

The Home Upgrade Grant scheme (HUGs) is designed to tackle colder homes that do <u>not</u> have mains gas central heating. Homeowners and tenants in Worcestershire could benefit from a variety of measures to help reduce energy bills including internal and external wall insulation, loft and cavity wall insulation, air source heat pumps, solar panels, draught proofing and many more.

To qualify, households must:

- not use mains gas to heat their home,
- have a gross annual income of less than £31,000,
- have a current home Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating of D to G

Funding is also available for landlords in the charity and private rented sector.

Those who qualify for the scheme will undergo a free technical survey to determine the most suitable energy efficiency measures. All projects must be completed by March 2025.


