#### Providence

# Acts: what's the big idea?

Continuing the series introducing the books of the Bible...

The Acts of the Apostles was written by Luke, a physician-friend and fellow-traveller of Paul. It complements his gospel, both being written for Theophilus (*Luke 1:3; Acts 1:1*), circa AD 63 during Paul's first Roman imprisonment.

While Luke's gospel records what Jesus began to do and teach, Acts tells us about what Jesus continued to do and teach through the disciples empowered by the Holy Spirit (Acts 1:1-3).

#### Luke's aim is to:

- Present a history: Christianity has a firm historical foundation. The life and teaching of Jesus Christ are recorded in the Gospels. Acts provides an account of the spread of the Church as the result of the work of the risen Lord and the Holy Spirit through the apostles.
- Give a defence: We read speeches to Jews (eg *Acts 4:8–12*) and Gentiles (eg *Acts 25:8–11*) showing us how the early Church challenged pagan and Jewish thought, the Roman government and Hellenistic culture.
- Provide a guide: We see basic gospel principles being applied to specific situations in the context of problems and persecution. These same principles are applicable for us today.
- ◆ Depict the triumph of Christianity in the face of bitter persecution: The success of the Church carrying the gospel from Jerusalem to Rome and planting local churches demonstrates that it operates under the rule of the exalted Christ and through the power of the Holy Spirit.

'But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth' (Acts 1:8). Just as the Holy Spirit empowered the first Christians in their witness, so He will do the same for us today!

#### Easter: a new world is ushered in

'Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary of Magdala went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance. So she came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple... and said "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!" (John 20:1-2).

No one was ready for Christ's resurrection. On the Friday, two sympathetic Jewish council members, Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus, had taken the body of Jesus down from the cross, burying Him in a new tomb before the guards had moved into place. Thirty-six hours later, the tomb was empty and the guards were scattered – to be paid off with hush money by the chief priests (*Matthew 28:12*).

The account rings with authenticity. Here is no ingenious attempt at a carefully-contrived scenario, with Pontius Pilate or Caiaphas the High Priest falling back in confusion before a resurrected Christ and a crowd of impressive witnesses. The whole account has feet running everywhere – *yet ushering in a new world that would never be the same again.* At this stage it is a complete jumble.

- 1. The right actions but the wrong deductions: Mary Magdalene witnesses the empty tomb then runs, rousing Peter and John, having concluded that her Lord's body had been taken away. She returns to the tomb and only then meets the risen Lord for herself.
- 2. The quick feet but the slow minds: As for Peter and John, they breathlessly reach the tomb and are gazing at the grave clothes. How long did they wait? John eventually perceives what has happened and believes (*John 20:8*). In his account he admits his slowness to take in the truth of the resurrection (*John 20:9*).
- 3. The new era but the familiar routine: John 20:10 gives us an interesting statement, 'Then the disciples went back to their homes.' There was Jerusalem outside just the same. Before long they'd go out fishing again (John 21:3). Life looked unchanged for the present.

Yet, from now on, Christ's gift of Resurrection to eternal life would captivate hearts, loyalties and energies for ever.

# The ultimate offer to humanity

This Easter the media will rightly remind us of the carnage in Ukraine and the Middle East. For as we celebrate this great Festival, commemorating Christ's victory over evil, we are confronted with death, barbarity and terror in the world. Unless we choose to live in fantasyland, we have to relate the two.

First, Jesus Christ did not escape death. Nor did He promise His followers a trouble-free world. Actually, they can expect an above-average share of suffering.

Secondly, we believe that Christ's death was no accident, no mistake. It was typical of the evil deeds that human beings mete out to each other. Innocent suffering did not begin in Jerusalem and will not end there. But the crucifixion was a calculated risk: God's costly and unexpected intervention in human affairs. The Christian claim that God's Son was put to death is deeply offensive to religious groups who cannot believe that the remote and all-powerful God, to whom human beings should submit, has Himself submitted to our brutality. Yet it is in this way that God enlists in His creation without violating it.

Thirdly, Christ's way of sacrifice, forgiveness and reconciliation is God's ultimate offer to the human race.

The first reaction of the people who witnessed the resurrection of Jesus Christ was fear. Incredulity, too, but fear. And no wonder: they were seeing the King of Kings.

In the last book of the Bible, the Risen Christ is described like this, 'I saw one like the Son of Man, clothed with a long robe and with a golden sash across His chest. His head and His hair were white as white wool, white as snow; His eyes were like a flame of fire, His feet were like burnished bronze refined in a furnace, and His voice was like the sound of many waters... When I saw Him, I fell at His feet as though dead' (Revelation 1:13-17).

That is the proper first response of reverence and respect to a vision of God. Only then can we hear the words spoken by this terrifying figure, 'Do not be afraid: I am the First and the Last, and the Living One. I was dead, and see I am alive forever and ever; and I have the keys of death and the world of the dead' (Revelation 1:17-18).

# Chocolate: food of the gods!

Did you know that the botanical name for the cocoa bean is *Theobroma*, which means 'food of the gods'? Millions of us obviously think chocolate is special – on average, each of us consumes 8.1kg of it a year!

Certainly, chocolate makes us feel better. Some scientists believe this is due to the chemicals it contains. These trigger the release of endorphins, similar to those we naturally produce when we fall in love.

But nutritionists warn against using chocolate as a pick-me-up, especially in the evening. Chocolate eaten before bedtime can cause your blood glucose levels to plummet during the night, which will disrupt your sleep. Chocolate eaten in quantity every day can lead to mood and energy swings, weight gain and poor immunity. If you have mad cravings for it, you could have a problem with blood sugar, or a deficiency in magnesium, copper, zinc or iron.

But occasional consumption of cocoa can provide medical benefits. Chocolate containing 60% or more cocoa solids is rich in essential trace elements and nutrients such as iron, calcium and potassium, and many vitamins. Cocoa is also the highest natural source of magnesium.

Good as all this may be, most of us enjoy chocolate because of its high sugar and caffeine content. Chocolate simply gives you an instant sugar hit, providing a sudden burst in energy – unfortunately followed by a slump and the desire for another sugar-fix.
