# Thought for the month

# With love from God to you... X

When we sign a card we often put an 'X' at the bottom to represent love or a kiss. When we think of God's love, those of Christian faith understand the cross portrayed at a different angle, as '+', representing the sacrificial death and resurrection of Jesus.

At Christmastime, we are anticipating the love of God, wrapped in the gift of a baby born as Jesus Christ, the Son of God, into hugely dangerous circumstances. Jesus' adulthood launched him into a time of learning, teaching and living out faith in his Father God, a call on his life which would lead him into continuing dangerous circumstances and ultimately to his crucifiXion.

That word 'crucifixion' has an 'X' in it. In our times 'X' can mean 'wrong'. The Easter story may seem confusing or unbelievable or wrong, but in God's plan it was 'right'. God's love for you, which is unwrapped as the baby born at Christmas, lasts through his rising at Eastertime and forever. Faith in Jesus comes as we allow the Holy Spirit to grow in us the belief and trust that God's love is here for us and for everyone to grasp and cherish, as a thankful child does a gift at Christmas. This hymn by Percy Dearmer captures the idea:

God is love: his the care, tending each, everywhere. God is love, all is there! Jesus came to show him, that mankind might know him! None can see God above; we can share life and love; thus may we Godward move, seek him in creation, holding every nation. Jesus lived on the earth, life and hope brought to birth and affirmed human worth, for he came to save us by the truth he gave us. To our Lord, praise we sing, light and life, friend and king, coming down love to bring, pattern for our duty, showing God in beauty.

The chorus goes 'Sing aloud, loud, loud!' When we sing aloud the age-old carols, may we remember that God longs for his love to be unwrapped in our hearts and our lives this Christmas and always... 'X'.

### Climate care

Although this article describes events that happened in Harvington, the thoughts apply everywhere...

Our hearts go out to the people of Valencia, who lost over 200 relatives and friends in the recent unprecedented storm. Less widely reported was equally-intense rain in Japan in the same week, and back in September a wall of rain fell from the Caribbean to North Carolina – a 'once in 1,000 year' event. The planet's increased temperature means that storms have more energy, carry more rain. With the Paris Agreement 'limit' of 1.5°C having been breached in early November we can expect rainfall to become more intense and last longer.

Those of us who were living in Harvington in 2007 will remember the unprecedented rain which inundated houses in Leys Road, nearly flooded the school and destroyed the village hall's floor and heating. I well remember a manhole cover dancing 3ft in the air on top of a fountain of mixed floodwater and sewage in Stratford Road!

Communities adapt. The village hall was repaired by volunteers, Severn Trent installed larger sewers and holding tanks under Leys Road and Stratford Road, and Wychavon DC and others installed the barrier mound and attenuation ponds at the foot of the field descending from Atch Lench. This has become the volunteer-maintained Community Orchard.

I suspect that 2007 event was a new phenomenon – an 'atmospheric river'. Atmospheric scientists have used satellite imagery to trace around eight such events deluging Europe between 1979 and 2011. These collect water over a hot Caribbean, carry it in a stream lasting many hours and dump this 'river' when high ground is encountered – such as The Lenches! These 'rivers' can have as much flow as the Amazon and are not forecast by Met Office models.

What can we do? Some Leys Road residents are – wisely – adding further flood defences. We can all think about how our properties will handle more intense rain than we've ever met before. Water butts are not enough. Try to keep it in your own property, out of buildings, over soil into which it can later seep away.

## Gospel of Mark: what's the big idea?

Continuing the series introducing the books of the Bible...

Mark is the second of the synoptic gospels, along with Matthew and Luke. Traditionally this gospel is ascribed to John Mark, a close associate of Peter. It was written for Gentile readers, probably in Rome during Nero's persecution of the church (c AD64-7).

Mark unveils Jesus' public ministry with the words 'The beginning of the gospel about Jesus Christ, the Son of God' (Mark 1:1). The gospel provides a succinct and vivid account of Jesus' ministry, concentrating on what Jesus did rather than what He said. Mark moves quickly from one episode to another, often using the word 'immediately' which is characteristic of his gospel.

For Mark, understanding the true identity of Jesus is fundamental to his gospel. Jesus asks the disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' (Mark 8:27), to which Peter replies, 'You are the Christ'. This is evident in Jesus' role as teacher, the call for discipleship and the account of Jesus' death and resurrection, which occupies the last third of the gospel.

A key verse which helps us to understand the nature of Jesus' mission and how we might live in the light of it is, 'Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many' (Mark 10:44-45). As the Suffering Servant, Jesus gave His life on the cross, that we might know and share his love.

Mark is understandably in a hurry to tell us about Jesus: the One who reveals the truth of God to us, that we might live in reality, not ignorance!

# Christmas geese

The story is told of a farmer who didn't believe in Jesus. One snowy Christmas Eve, his wife was taking their children to a service at their local church. He refused to come, saying, 'Why would God lower Himself to come to Earth as a man? That's ridiculous!' So they left him at home.

That evening, as the winds grew stronger and the snow turned to a blizzard, he heard a series of loud thumps on the window. In the field near his house he saw a flock of wild geese who had been migrating south when they got caught in the snowstorm. They were lost and stranded, with no food or shelter.

The man wanted to help the geese and opened the doors of the barn, hoping they would go inside for shelter. But the geese didn't do anything, despite the man's efforts to move them. He made a breadcrumb trail leading to the barn and tried to shoo them toward the open doors, but they only got more scared and scattered.

Nothing he did could get them to go into the barn. 'Why don't they follow me?!' Then he realised, 'If only I were a goose and became one of them, then I could save them.' Finally, he understood the heart of the Christmas message. God has become one of us in Jesus. The eternal creator God has entered time and space as a baby, to show us who God is and how we can know Him.

This Christmas, let's celebrate again the amazing truth that we have a God who knows and can meet our needs in Jesus. 'The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call Him Immanuel, which means "God with us" (Matthew 1:23).

# On why Carol Services are so dangerous...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

So, you are excited about being invited to plan your first Carol Service. Take care – the dangers involved are only slightly less than being invited to judge the best cake made by the Ladies' Group. You seem to have no idea of the lifelong offence you will inevitably cause.

First, you have to decide which groups are going to be represented to give the readings. If the Brownies were asked last year, it has to be the Cubs this time. But don't forget that every third year, the Boys' Brigade must be asked or they will take their revenge and get their flag tangled in the nave chandelier come Remembrance Sunday. If someone represents the choir, then over a four-year period, all four voice parts must be called on – and if the organist isn't asked on the fifth year, all hymns subsequently will be played at double speed and with one verse missing. Should one person have been invited to read for two successive years, their annual appearance thereafter will be taken as an inalienable right for the rest of their lifetime – and probably longer than that. To drop them may well invoke legal proceedings,

# The challenges of Christmas

Christmas is a great time of year but it's not without its challenges. After one family had put up 250,000 Christmas lights, they didn't dare boil a kettle for fear of blowing the system!

The challenge of over-indulging: We all remember the episode of the Vicar of Dibley where she had to consume four Christmas dinners! Christmas is a time when we usually eat and drink far too much, the average person putting on six pounds in weight. But Christmas is not simply about gaining weight, but losing what weighs us down. 'Cast all your anxiety on Him, because He cares for you' (1 Peter 5:7). Whatever your concerns or worries this Christmas, bring them to God.

The challenge of overspending: In the rush to buy Christmas cards, a woman bought a pack of 50 identical cards. Without reading the verse, she hastily signed and sent them off, but for one. A few days later she read the message: 'This card is just to say a little gift is on the way.' Christmas is not about getting into debt, but God getting us out of debt. He spent exactly what was needed on the first Christmas night. 'You are to give Him the name Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins' (Matthew 1:21).

The challenge is over too quickly: Christmas doesn't last very long, yet the effect of the first Christmas is long-lasting. 'For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life' (John 3:16). Jesus has come to bring us life in all its fullness, both for now and all eternity.

How do we face the challenges of Christmas? 'Yet what I can, I give Him – give my heart'.




