Climate change and Christian faith

A crisis of stewardship

When God placed humans in the Garden of Eden, He gave us a profound responsibility: to 'work and keep' His creation (*Genesis 2:15*). The Hebrew words abad (work/serve) and shamar (keep/protect) speak not of domination, but of careful stewardship. We were meant to be gardeners of God's creation, nurturing and protecting it as a sacred trust.

Instead, we have too often been its destroyers.

The climate crisis represents a profound failure of this divine calling. Through our actions and inactions, we have brought God's creation to a point of crisis. Rising temperatures, extreme weather, species extinction and environmental degradation are not just ecological challenges – they are spiritual failures that reflect our broken relationship with both Creator and creation.

The prophet Jeremiah's ancient warning finds new resonance today, 'How long will the land lie parched and the grass in every field be withered? Because those who live in it are wicked, the animals and birds have perished' (Jeremiah 12:4).

Climate change is not merely a political issue or scientific challenge – it is a moral and spiritual crisis that reflects our collective sin. When we knowingly continue practices that harm God's creation, we sin against our Creator, whose work we destroy; our neighbours, especially the poor who suffer first and worst from climate impacts; future generations, whose inheritance we squander; and the whole of creation, which 'groans' under our mismanagement (*Romans 8:22*).

The climate crisis calls us to rediscover ancient truths: that we are creatures, not creators; stewards, not owners; called to tend, not exploit. 'The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof (Psalm 24:1). We have failed to treat it accordingly.

As climate scientist Katherine Heyhoe reminds us in her book *Saving Us* (2021), 'God has given us a spirit of power, which enables us to act instead of being frozen or paralysed.' This power demands we face our failures and acknowledge our responsibility. The crisis before us is not just environmental – it is a test of our faithfulness to God's original commission and our willingness to embrace our role as stewards rather than destroyers of His creation.

Gospel of Luke: what's the big idea?

Continuing the series introducing the books of the Bible...

Luke is the third of the synoptic gospels. The gospel and Acts were both written for Theophilus, a Roman official, who acted as Luke's patron to ensure that his gospel was copied and distributed. It was intended for a wider audience, to help both Gentile believers and unbelievers understand who Jesus is and that the gospel is intended for the whole world.

Luke's account of Jesus' life and ministry can be divided into four main sections: the coming and early life of Jesus (*Luke 1:1-4:13*); Jesus' ministry in and around Galilee (*Luke 4:14-9:50*); His ministry (mainly teaching) on the road to Jerusalem (*Luke 9:51-24:53*) and His final week in Jerusalem (*Luke 19:28-24:53*).

For Luke, the key focus is how God's plan of salvation for the world is fulfilled in Jesus. Therefore, he writes an orderly account ranging from the birth of Jesus to His ascension. He is a strong champion of the outsider. As an outsider himself (a Gentile writer in the New Testament) he shows how Jesus includes those who are typically seen as outsiders by the religious establishment of His day. This includes women, the poor and sinners (including tax collectors, prostitutes and shepherds!) as well as showing how Gentiles, Samaritans and Jews are all included in God's plan of salvation. Luke also emphasises the importance of prayer in Jesus' ministry and the role of the Holy Spirit.

A key verse reflecting this perspective is found when Jesus encounters the tax collector Zacchaeus, 'For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost' (Luke 19:10). Whenever we find ourselves on the outside of God's life and love, as Zacchaeus, Jesus comes to find us and welcome us afresh into His kingdom.

Thoughts for 2025

As this is the first issue in 2025...

2025 is a year of Jubilee in the Roman Catholic Church, an event which takes place every 25 years. It's a special year of forgiveness and reconciliation when people are invited to come back into the right relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation. This acts as a challenge for all of us:

- How can we spend more time talking and listening to God through reading the Bible and prayer?
- How can we grow our love for our family and friends?
- How can we make more impact at work, by demonstrating an attractive faith to colleagues?

When Joshua led God's people to the banks of the Jordan, ready to cross over into the Promised Land, he said, 'you have never been this way before' (Joshua 3:4). At the beginning of a New Year, when we don't know what the future holds, how can we grow in our relationship with God?

Keep our focus on God: The people were told to follow the Ark, symbolising God's presence, as they crossed the river. Let's keep our focus on God and His Word throughout this year and keep in step with where He is leading us.

Consecrate ourselves: Joshua said, 'Consecrate yourselves, for tomorrow the Lord will do amazing things among you' (Joshua 3:5). God has exciting opportunities ahead for us in this coming year! Let us dedicate our lives afresh to Him, as we let go of known sin and keep our eyes open on seeing God at work in all of our lives.

Will 2025 be a good year for us? As Abraham Lincoln said, 'In the end, it's not the years in your life that count, it's the life in your years.'

Love in action

'Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth' (1 John 3:18).

The writer Gary Chapman describes how love can be expressed in five different 'languages': words of encouragement, quality time, gifts, acts of service and touch. Do you have a preferred language of love? As we think about St Valentine during this month, let's consider how God's love language is expressed in the word agape. This is exclusively found in the New Testament and is uniquely defined by Jesus, 'This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down His life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters' (1 John 3:16). Jesus' giving of His life on the cross provides the model for how we can demonstrate God's love in our relationships with others.

It is self-giving: are we ready to put the other person first, as Jesus did when He died for us in our place. Are we generous with our time, words, money and service, whatever the cost?

It takes the initiative: are we ready to show love to those who don't deserve it or who we find hard to love? Do we have eyes of compassion to see their needs and a heart to love and serve them?

It is intentional: are we ready to get close to those in need around us, irrespective of the time we have or how we feel?

The story is told of Jesus asking a little child, 'how much do you love me?' The child replied, 'lots and lots and lots!' Then they asked Jesus how much He loved them. Jesus stretched out His arms wide and said 'I love you this much' as they nailed Him to a cross.

On the importance of NOT keeping accurate minutes...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

Since you were the one to ask this parishioner of yours to act as PCC secretary, you have no reason to complain about the minutes of meetings she produces. You should never let anyone act as a secretary unless they cannot speak English or are hard of hearing, preferably both. The more significant the committee and the more contentious the issues being debated, the more you should nobly put yourself forward both to chair the meeting and take the minutes. This will spare the other members that awkward moment when you ask for a volunteer and they all feel the sudden need to stare at their feet.

If you act as secretary, you can be certain that accounts of what took place will only be what you had wanted to happen and that the decisions taken will be what you had already decided before discussions started. Any inconvenient observations from other committee members can be omitted entirely.

Admittedly, the more observant may notice that your accounts of the meeting may not wholly agree with their recollections, but the skill of being a secretary is not to produce the minutes of the meeting until the day before the next one. This means the great majority will have long forgotten what actually *did* happen two months previously, and many will not have had the time to read them anyway and will avoid having to admit that fact by passing them.

Only the deeply committed will want to pursue apparent discrepancies. In that case, confess that your hand-written notes were accidentally left on a bus and you can no longer check the accuracy of what you have written. You could even give the bus route number and time of day you travelled. Someone will soon suggest you proceed to the next item on the agenda.

In the same way as church rotas bear no resemblance to the people who actually turn up to do the jobs, minutes of meetings need not bear too much resemblance to what actually happened, especially if what did happen is inconvenient for you. Democracy is all very well – provided a benign dictator is in overall control.

FLY TIPPING IN THE LENCHES

Residents of The Lenches will be only too well aware of the issue of fly-tipping in the lanes outside our villages. In the last couple of years this has grown from an irritating eyesore to a significant danger as these criminals progressed to tipping onto the roads rather than the verges. This is part of a national problem – in 2023 there were over a million reported incidents of fly-tipping in England and Wales. What is being done about this and what can we do locally?

Worcestershire has an e-permit scheme which allows any resident to dispose of trade or household waste free of charge at a recycling centre, as long as the vehicle is no bigger than a van or a pick up truck. Trailers are also allowed. If you are using tradesmen to dispose of waste from a house or garden project, ask them if they have a permit. Most of the fly-tipping in The Lenches is relatively small scale and could easily fit into a van.

Ultimately, it is up to residents to check that waste is properly and responsibly disposed of. Always ask where the waste is going! Fly-tippers have no excuses – trade and household waste disposal is free of charge.

Happy New Year to everyone! It has been lovely to see the children back in school after such a busy period leading up to Christmas even though it has been a very cold start to the term!

The children worked really hard to put on some amazing Christmas performances last term. Nursery, Reception and KS1 told the Nativity story through singing and dancing in their play *The Bethlehem Star* while KS2 held a carol service in the church where they sang beautifully and told the Nativity story from the perspective of the people involved. During the last week of the term, children from Reception to Year 5 visited Worcester Swan Theatre to watch *Aladdin*: they laughed through the whole performance! We also had Christmas parties, a very tasty Christmas dinner and a visit from Father Christmas! Everyone was certainly feeling the Christmas spirit by the time the end of term arrived.

This half term started with our theme days where children were thinking about dreams and goals in PSHE, and how we need to persevere with challenges to achieve our goals. The children looked at a range of Bible stories as part of their *Understanding Christianity* work, Year 1 even baked their own bread after learning about Jesus feeding the five thousand.

Our core value for this half term is *Forgiveness*. We will be teaching the children that everyone makes mistakes: it's part of being human. Sometimes mistakes hurt others and we need to say sorry; sometimes mistakes made by other people hurt us. When this happens, we need to be able to forgive. We will look at how God's love is so great that forgiveness is always possible.

We are looking forward to a number of trips later in the half term including the Year 5 residential trip to Condover Hall in Shropshire, a visit to the Black Country Museum and to a Jewish synagogue.
