Thought for the month

Leadership

So we now have a new government... Another few years or more of national politics and promises... And the hope that those on the margins, whether the poor, the alone, the homeless, the sick or those already affected by the climate catastrophe, will feel that a real change is being made for the people who inhabit the Kingdom of God now on earth.

The Bible, especially the New Testament, asks that the reader pay due regard to the authorities (*Romans 13:1* and *1 Peter 2:13-14*), especially important in Roman occupied lands. But what of modern times when trust in Government is low, with less than 50% feeling governments put people's interests above the party they represent? The young in particular may feel very separated from national politics, while some are making choices on products and attitudes via their social media platforms even though they did not vote in significant numbers in the General Election.

There are many examples of leadership across all generations with young people doing amazing things to raise money and awareness of causes that touch them, their family, friends and neighbourhoods. So while we may feel despairing or hopeful or just "more of the same" about the new government, we can look for and emulate true leadership amongst those with whom we live, work, study and socialise. Jesus' model of servant leadership is one we may observe and aim to emulate.

In Matthew's gospel in the Message version of the Bible Jesus says, 'You've observed how godless rulers throw their weight around, how quickly a little power goes to their heads. It's not going to be that way with you. Whoever wants to be great must become a servant. Whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave. That is what the Son of Man has done: He came to serve, not be served – and then to give away his life in exchange for the many who are held hostage' (Matthew 20:25-28). Amen to that.

Olympic Games

July sees the start of the Olympic Games in Paris. In describing the Christian life as a marathon race, the writer of Hebrews (chapter 12:1-2) challenges us to finish well.

'throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles' (Hebrews 12:1): As in a normal race, we have to get rid of any burdens that weigh us down (eg possessions, worries, what others think of us) and besetting sins (wrong habits or attitudes). We can cast our burdens on the Lord (Psalm 55:22) and be assured of His forgiveness (1 John 1:9).

'run with perseverance the race marked out for us' (*Hebrews 12:1*): Christian life is like a marathon, not a sprint race, and calls for endurance. The course is marked out for us as we each have a unique race to run with its opportunities and difficulties. God knows our path and will provide all that we need to complete the race.

'fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith' (Hebrews 12:2): The runner keeps their focus on the finishing line and avoids all distractions. Our focus is on Jesus, who has run the race before us (the 'author') but is the one who can show us how to finish well (the 'perfecter').

We are also surrounded by a 'great cloud of witnesses' (Hebrews 12:1). These are God's people, both past and present, who are cheering us on!

During the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, the British athlete Derek Redmond was running in the 400 metres semi-finals when, about 250 metres from the finish, his hamstring tore and he fell to the ground in pain. His father ran on to the track to support him in completing the race. Let's not forget that whatever we face, God is there beside to enable us to finish the race!

Musings

A bus station is where a bus stops. A train station is where a train stops. On my desk, I have a work station...

If I agreed with you, we'd both be wrong.

Doubts about the Christian faith? Take action now!

Do you have doubts about the Christian faith? July is the month for you to decide what to do about them. This month the Church remembers Doubting Thomas, and there IS action *you* can take, either way.

You know the story: Thomas was the only apostle not present when Jesus appeared to the disciples on the evening of His resurrection. When the rejoicing disciples later told Thomas that Jesus was alive, he flatly refused to believe them. He had seen the crucifixion. The gospel goes on to relate that a week later Jesus indeed appeared to Thomas, and invited him to put his hand into the holes in His hands and feet. Thomas was utterly overwhelmed. His response was 'My Lord and My God!' He saw, he believed.

Then Jesus said something which is relevant to us today, 'Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed' (John 20:29). Jesus KNOWS it can be hard for you to believe that He is indeed alive, and Lord of all. Which is, of course, where we are today. Perhaps you really struggle with doubt. Well, there are two courses of action you can take:

- 1. Don't read the Bible. Begin to forget what Christianity teaches. Don't go to church. Don't ask God, or anyone else, for help. Your 'doubts' are perfectly honest questions, but stop looking for answers. Assume that because you have questions, there are no answers.
- 2. Look for some answers. Find out what the New Testament actually says about Jesus by reading it! Do not be confused into thinking that you 'doubt' something which you may not even really 'know.' Pray remember that Jesus said that those who believe without seeing are 'blessed'. So, ask God that, if He is there, please would He 'bless' you by opening your eyes to spiritual realities. Go to church. Yes, the Christian faith demands that we take God at His word, with no evidence other than His Word. But though we believe in Jesus without seeing Him, we do NOT believe without considering Him. Faith is not blind credulity and unthinking naiveté. We have faith in the historic person of Jesus Christ.

Peter writes some real encouragement in his first epistle, 'Though you have not seen Him, you love Him; and even though you do not see Him now, you believe

Ruth: what's the big idea?

Continuing the series introducing the books of the Old Testament...

The book of Ruth is a story of God's grace operating in difficult circumstances during the period of the Judges. It unfolds as a four-act drama, telling the story of how Naomi, her husband and two sons leave Judah for Moab, where her sons marry. When Naomi's husband and sons die, she returns to Bethlehem in Judah.

In the first act, Naomi tells her Moabite daughters-in-law, Orpah and Ruth, to stay in Moab. However, Ruth refuses to leave Naomi and accompanies her to Bethlehem (*Ruth:1*). In the next act Ruth meets Boaz, a relative of Naomi, while gathering barley in his fields (*Ruth:2*).

The third act takes place at the threshing floor where Boaz is asleep and Ruth lies at his feet. She expresses her desire to marry him, as her kinsman-redeemer. But Boaz tells her of another prior claim (*Ruth:3*). Finally, at the city gate, the other relative renounces his claim, and Boaz marries Ruth (*Ruth:4*).

In Ruth's story we see God's unseen hand directing the lives of the characters to accomplish his purpose eg 'Naomi returned from Moab accompanied by Ruth, arriving in Bethlehem as the barley harvest was beginning' (Ruth 1:22). He transforms Naomi's sorrow into joy, rewarding Ruth with a place of honour in Israel's history. In Boaz, we see a foreshadowing of the work of Jesus Christ, as he pays the price to secure Ruth's future.

'In its artful telling of this "outsider" widow, uprooted and obscure, who turns out to be the great-grandmother of David and the ancestor of Jesus, the book of Ruth makes it possible for each of us to understand ourselves, however ordinary, as irreplaceable in the full telling of God's story' (Eugene Peterson).

Using rest to pray

Most of us think of prayer as a very demanding activity, but did you know it can be extremely restful?

One of the great verses in the Bible says 'Be still and know that I am God' (Psalm 46:10). It suggests we experience God most fully when we are still. When we cease rushing around, pausing for a moment of thought and recollection, we are becoming prayerful, and God is very near. Even a break for a morning coffee can be a moment of prayer, if we slow ourselves down and allow our thoughts to turn towards God.

An essential part of resting is to breathe slowly. Christian tradition has always made a connection between prayer and breathing. You can learn to pray to the rhythm of your breathing, using chosen prayer words to focus. As you breathe in, you might say 'Abba', and then as you breathe out, add the word 'Father'. Choose words which are meaningful to you, deliberately slowing your breathing so you become relaxed and peaceful.

Perhaps you have a favourite chair where you are able to unwind easily. For a few moments sit and do nothing. Simply become aware of the present moment, reminding yourself you are in the presence of God. As you feel yourself relax, bask in the knowledge of God's love and acceptance of you. Sense His smile of approval upon you. You don't have to do anything, just 'be' for a moment. This too is prayer.

Sometimes we are forced to rest by circumstances: illness, disability, growing older slow us down and we can't rush around like we used to do. Never mind. Don't fight against your circumstances. Enter into the place of rest that God is giving you. He loves you for who you are, not for what you do. Turn your thoughts into prayer and offer them to God. You don't need to advise God as to what He should do; simply hold people before Him, leaving the outcome to Him.

Prayer should be a natural expression of our relationship with God. Sometimes we have words, sometimes silence is enough. We don't need to impress God with our fervour. We can relax and be rested, even as we pray.

On the perils of 'standing in' for another vicar...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

You should not complain about doing duty in other churches when their clergy are on holiday. It is only in other churches that you will be appreciated. Beatification only comes from your own church on the day you leave – which is a way of firing a shot across the bows of your successor. I remember being greeted by a churchwarden on my first day here at St James the Least of All with the encouraging words, 'I've seen six Rectors of this parish; each one was worse than the last.' As the years have gone by, I am sure I will have entirely fulfilled his expectations.

No; when you visit another church, you will be told all the many defects of their own vicar, and whatever *you* do will be praised. Store up these memories for the day you return to your own patch – when you will then be told how outstanding your own temporary replacement has been and how congregations thrived in your absence. Naturally, this gives you the right to make similar remarks about your own congregation in the churches you visit. Just make sure that the church you are staffing is sufficiently far from your own that word will not get back to your home team.

Inevitably, when you staff another church, you will be told, 'It's the normal Service.' It will be nothing of the sort. Hymns will appear in unexpected places, Sunday schools will enter and leave (and enter again) apparently at random, objects will be brought to you to be read from, placed on the altar or blessed – just as you were about to try and find the pulpit. In any case, wherever you are standing, you will find you should have been standing somewhere else. But not to worry: most mistakes will be forgiven – provided your sermon is short.

So – enjoy your visits to other churches. And above all, make sure that your temporary replacement is so spectacularly incompetent that your own people will welcome you back with open arms on your return.




