What's involved in appointing a new Rector?

People have asked what's involved in appointing a new Rector so here's the process, which is similar to most jobs but with more people involved.

Once a vacancy is announced, a job description is drawn up. In a parish context this is called a Parish Profile. Representatives from Parochial Church Councils (PCCs) draw up a description of their respective parishes. The applicant knows the type of community – city, town or rural – they will be serving and living in plus what goes on and the needs of the community. There will be a description of the types of services that take place every week or month.

The profile will also include a description of the type of person being looked for and the jobs they might cover. The house, schools and amenities offered form a key part of what might attract an applicant as the salary is set by the Diocese and the Church of England and does not depend on the size or number of parishes in the Benefice.

Next, an advertisement is put out and potential candidates may be approached and invited to apply. If applications are received (and it is a competitive market: relatively few clergy are looking for jobs and many, like me, are retiring as I am part of the baby boom generation, so there is no guarantee there will be any applicants but in our case we are hopeful) a short list is drawn up by members of the PCCs.

The candidate(s) will be invited for interview. The interview panel will include a representative from each church in the Benefice, plus representatives from the Bishop and Cathedral (the holders of the freehold). In my experience they are most helpful and guide the PCC members (if required) in the questions they can ask. The PCC members have the final say as to whom is appointed.

The appointment will be announced on the same Sunday at the parish(es) to which the person is moving as well as the parish(es) they are leaving. The appointed person may be required to give three month's notice at their current parish, unless they are a curate (trainee priest) in which case the notice period could be shorter. They are allowed a month to move out of their last home and into the new one.

Mary Magdalene

Six Marys are mentioned in the New Testament, including Mary Magdalene who is remembered in the church's calendar on 22nd July. What can we learn from Mary's story?

We don't have to be defined by our past: When Jesus encountered Mary He cast seven demons out of her (*Luke 8:2*). As a result, her life was transformed and she became a follower of Jesus. Her life as a disciple was no longer defined by the person she had been. Like Mary, we don't have to let our past without Christ dictate how we see ourselves today.

Make Jesus the centre of our world: Along with some of the women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases (*Luke 8:1-3*), Mary followed Jesus and His disciples and supported them in ministry. She was there at the cross (*Matthew 27:55-56*) and one of the first to the tomb on the Sunday (*Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1, John 20:1-18*). Like Mary, we are called to serve Jesus as dedicated disciples.

Jesus uses the weakest people for His purposes: Mary is a great example of Paul's words: 'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong' (1 Corinthians 1:27). At a time when women were regarded as second-class citizens with no real autonomy, Jesus had a special compassion and care for women. Alongside Mary, the women's witness to the resurrection was taken seriously. We shouldn't be quick to dismiss the things that don't agree with our expectations, as Jesus doesn't always do what we expect! He delights in working out His plans through unlikely people and in surprising ways. He did this through Mary and, if we allow Him, He can do it through us!

Musings...

Proverbs: what's the big idea?

Continuing the series introducing the books of the Bible...

The Book of Proverbs is an anthology of sayings that are generally attributed to Solomon (*Proverbs 1:1*), who uttered 3,000 proverbs (*1 Kings 4:32*). The purpose of these oracles is 'for attaining wisdom and discipline' (*Proverbs 1:2*). Solomon was concerned that people, especially the young, should understand 'the sayings and riddles of the wise' (*Proverbs 1:3-6*). His guiding principle is that 'the fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge' (*Proverbs 1:7*).

To give an idea of the recurring themes in the book, here are a few examples:

- ◆ Knowing God: 'The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding' (Proverbs 9:10)
- Guarding our speech: 'A word aptly spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver' (Proverbs 25:11)
- ◆ Marital faithfulness: 'May your fountain be blessed and may you rejoice in the wife of your youth' (Proverbs 5:15-20)
- Our work: 'Go to the ant, you sluggard; consider its ways and be wise!' (Proverbs 6:6-11)
- ◆ Dangers of strong drink: 'Wine is a mocker and beer a brawler; whoever is led astray by them is not wise' (Proverbs 20:1)
- ◆ Justice and honesty: 'The LORD abhors dishonest scales, but accurate weights are His delight' (Proverbs 11:1)

Underlying these sayings is a conviction about God's omniscience: 'For a man's ways are in full view of the LORD, and He examines all his paths' (Proverbs 5:21); providence: 'Many are the plans in a man's heart, but it is the LORD's purpose that prevails' (Proverbs 19:21); and goodness: 'The LORD is far from the wicked but He hears the prayer of the righteous' (Proverbs 15:29).

Proverbs reminds us that God is concerned with the way we live today. 'Wisdom is the art of living skilfully in whatever actual conditions we find ourselves' (Eugene Peterson).

The Nicene Creed: who is Jesus?

'We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.'

This month we are looking at what the Nicene Creed affirms about the person of Jesus Christ.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God: Jesus is presented as the unique Son of God. This reflects the big debate at the time, which was to counter the teachings of Arius who taught that Jesus was the first and greatest of God's creatures, but not the same as God the Father. Today we can be more concerned about Jesus' authority as a moral teacher, neglecting that Jesus the man is also truly God. 'We have seen His glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father' (John 1:14).

Eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father: These words affirm the divinity of Jesus. The phrase 'begotten not made' is crucial in understanding Jesus as the unique Son of the Father, who existed eternally of the same divine nature as the Father. 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning' (John 1:1-2). It is a powerful reminder that our belief revolves around trusting a person, not simply in a set of beliefs and moral teaching.

Through Him all things were made: The Creed affirms that Jesus the Son cannot be made, because through Him all things were made and only God can create from nothing. 'Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made' (John 1:3). This implies that our world was made good, with a purpose in which we can share.

Also, Jesus has the last word in promising to bring everything in heaven and on earth together at the end of time under His Lordship (*Ephesians 1:10*). This makes a real difference to how we see and treat God's Creation and those created in God's image.

In response to this, can we say that Jesus is Lord of every area of our life?

The Transfiguration

In August we celebrate Jesus' transfiguration, when Jesus took Peter, John and James with Him up a mountain to pray (*Luke 9:28-36*). Jesus was transfigured alongside Moses and Elijah: 'As He was praying, the appearance of His face changed, and His clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning' (*Luke 9:29*).

Jesus' transfiguration: Watch! The disciples' eyes were opened as Jesus' hidden divinity was revealed. The presence of Moses and Elijah confirmed Him as God's promised Messiah who fulfilled God's plan and purposes. By foreshadowing the cross, resurrection and ascension, this event powerfully calls us to entrust our lives into Jesus' hands to experience His presence and power.

The Father's Word: Listen! There came a voice from the cloud covering them: 'This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to Him' (Luke 9:35). God affirmed His love and call on Jesus as His beloved and chosen Son. This is the second time God spoke audibly about Jesus (cf Luke 3:22), but on this occasion He was speaking for the benefit of the disciples. Do we hear God speaking these same words to us? We listen to what Jesus says to us, knowing that like Him we are deeply loved and accepted by God.

The disciples' response: Learn! 'The disciples kept this to themselves and did not tell anyone at that time what they had seen' (Luke 9:36). They were impacted by this experience and needed time to reflect on what they had seen and heard about Jesus. Eight days earlier, they had been asked by Jesus, 'Who do you say I am?' (Luke 9:20). In the transfiguration, their understanding of Jesus was being transformed. As we reflect on Jesus' ministry, to encounter the real Jesus, we are also transformed.

Harvington First School News




