# Spring – now and not yet

This is the month of springtime, whether the meteorological Spring that started on 1<sup>st</sup> March or the Spring equinox on 20<sup>th</sup> March. But what exactly is the equinox? It's an astronomical moment when the length of day is equal to the length of night. Every year there are two equinoxes: one between March 19<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup>, when we leave winter and enter spring in the northern hemisphere, and the second between September 21<sup>st</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>, when we leave summer and enter autumn, again in the northern hemisphere. In concrete terms, the vernal equinox, better known as the spring equinox, coincides with the first day of spring on the Gregorian calendar. This marks the end of winter in the northern hemisphere. Conversely, in the southern hemisphere, it corresponds to the start of autumn.

There are many sayings in popular or folkloric language about Spring, such as 'if it rains in March, so it rains in June'; 'March winds and April showers, bring forth May flowers'; 'March comes in with adders' heads and goes out with peacocks' tails' and so on.

The Bible also mentions Spring and in an agrarian society it naturally focuses on the weather and growing crops. We have the example of farmers waiting **for the harvest**, 'Be patient, then, brothers and sisters, until the Lord's coming. See how the farmer waits for the land to yield its valuable crop, patiently waiting for the autumn and spring rains' (James 5:7); seasonal appreciation, 'They do not say to themselves, "Let us fear the Lord our God, who gives autumn and spring rains in season, who assures us of the regular weeks of harvest" (Jeremiah 5:24) and eager anticipation, 'They waited for me as for showers and drank in my words as the spring rain' (Job 29:23).

Whatever your tradition, get sowing and get growing. Amen

19<sup>th</sup> March: *Creative Reflection* (Abbots Morton VH)



# A Lent reflection

Somebody asked a Christian friend why he was eating doughnuts, when he had given them up for Lent! He answered, 'At the bakers I told God, that if He wanted me to buy doughnuts, He should provide a parking space in front. On the eighth time around, there it was!' Rather than seeing Lent simply as a time to give things up, let's use it intentionally for self-examination, reading Scripture, penitence, fasting and prayer.

At Jesus' baptism, God's voice says, 'You are My Son, whom I love; with You I am well pleased' (Luke 3:22). The Holy Spirit then leads Jesus into the wilderness, where we find Him coming to terms with who He is. Satan's temptations challenge Jesus in key three areas of His identity: His divine son-ship, political power and Messianic role (Luke 4:1-13). It is as though Jesus was looking into the mirror at Himself to discern what kind of Saviour He should be.

For us, Lent is an opportunity to hold up a mirror to ourselves and ask the question, *'who am I?'* It's a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and how we should live. What will we see when we hold up the mirror to ourselves? Keeping Lent, the 40 days running up to Easter, could mean taking time to read Scripture, studying a Christian book or spending five minutes each day in silence! We might fast by missing one or two meals, refraining from TV, alcohol, social media, or scrolling on our phones. All these can help us to give more attention to God in our lives.

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.

# Climate change and Christian faith

### A call to action and hope

Jesus's call to discipleship has always been radical, 'If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me' (Luke 9:23). Today, this call takes on new meaning in light of our environmental crisis.

The changes required to address climate change mirror Christ's broader teachings about discipleship. Just as Jesus called the rich young ruler to give up his possessions, we are called to examine our carbon-dependent lifestyles. Following Christ means daily decisions to walk a different path, challenging societal norms and choosing a simpler way of living.

The early church offers inspiration, having shared resources and lived simply (*Acts 2:44-45*). Today, we must embrace both personal and collective action; we must examine our consumption, make sustainable choices in travel, food, and energy use, and educate ourselves about environmental issues. The challenge is ultimately systemic – we must work together for meaningful change.

Jesus taught us to pray, 'Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven' (Matthew 6:10). This prayer reminds us that protecting and restoring creation is part of building God's kingdom. While the task seems daunting, Christians have profound reasons for hope: God's faithfulness to creation, the resurrection promise that brings life from death, and our kingdom purpose in Christ's work of renewal.

'For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it' (Matthew 16:25). Perhaps in letting go of our unsustainable ways, we can find the more abundant life Christ promised. The path ahead is challenging, but we walk it together, knowing that as we work to protect God's creation, we participate in His ongoing work of redemption.

Our response must be individual and communal: supporting climate-conscious policies in our churches, sharing resources and knowledge, advocating for systemic change, and caring for those affected by climate impacts. Though some may resist these changes, questioning their cost, we remember that Jesus's own ministry faced similar critiques when calling for radical change.

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# Bearing fruit takes time

The nine fruits of the Spirit are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. We don't strive for these fruits, rather we plant ourselves in good soil, allow ourselves to be fed by the Holy Spirit, keep taking in nourishment, turn to face the light of Christ and the fruits will develop and grow in our lives.

Can you tell whether a tree is an apple tree or a pear tree? Not easily when they are in blossom, but very easily when they bear fruit. Bearing fruit takes time and a lot of planting, preparation, nurture and growth.

March is the time of year when gardeners begin to plant seeds ready for summer, but patience is needed – the seeds will take a while to germinate and the gardener needs to write the names of seeds on labels and not forget which are fruit, flowers and vegetables. The seeds need to be in the dark or the light or the warmth or the cool, depending on the stage of life they have reached.

Just like the gardener, God is with us. God writes our names on His heart; He knows what fruit we can bring forth. God nurtures us and gives us light to grow. But first, we need to be planted and that can be scary.

Maybe you are feeling in a cold dark place this March, maybe it feels as if you've been buried, maybe you've got a weight above you and you can't see the way out. Just think that maybe you've been buried because you've been planted.

With patience, there will be warmth and light so be like a seed, trust God and **begin to grow out of the darkness towards God's marvellous light. We won't** see fruit immediately; we have to be nourished and mature and ripen. Patience will be given to us, fruit of the seed of the Holy Spirit.

# Gospel of John: what's the big idea?

Continuing the series introducing the books of the Bible...

'John's Gospel is like a pool in which a child may wade and an elephant can swim. It is for the beginner in the faith and for the mature Christian' (Leon Morris).

The Apostle John is usually credited with the authorship of this Gospel, writing in Ephesus at the end of the first century. His purpose is *'that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name'* (*John 20:31*). Throughout he stresses the deity of Christ and presents Jesus as the Son of God.

In the prologue (*John 1:1-14*) Jesus is presented as the pre-existent and incarnate Word of God revealed by the Father. It also highlights how He has come as light into the world, so that those who believe in Him will not remain in darkness (*cf John12:46*).

The heart of John's narrative contains seven *signs* or miracles, which demonstrate who Jesus is and His transforming power over creation and people: turning water into wine (*John 2:1-11*); healing the royal official's son (*John 4:46-54*); healing the paralytic (*John 5:1-18*); feeding the 5,000 (*John 6:1-14*); walking on the water (*John 6:16-21*); healing of the man born blind (*9:1-41*) and raising Lazarus (*John 11:1-44*).

After these signs, the story moves into the upper room discourses followed by the story of His death and resurrection. The whole Gospel is a revelation of the glory of God's only Son, who comes to reveal the Father and then returns in glory to the Father. It can be well summed up in the famous verse, 'For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life' (John 3:16).

## Is it time you remembered 'eureka!'?

As Lent gets underway, do you suspect that your Christian commitment is not all it could be? If so, you are not alone. As one American church leader sadly put it, 'In America the church is 3,000 miles wide – and one inch deep.'

But Jesus is still calling us to be His disciples, NOT His well-wishers from a safe distance! So how does one start as a disciple? It can be helpful to remember the story of John and Andrew in the first chapter of John's Gospel.

Firstly, John and Andrew were simply getting on with daily life when their teacher, John the Baptist, introduced them to Jesus. They hadn't been out looking for Him – but when they met Him, they were deeply affected. Andrew excitedly reported, 'We have found the Messiah' (*John 1:41*). His statement is true, but the more you read of the story, the more you'll realize that it was Jesus *who found them.* He is after YOU, too! If you encounter God, it is no accident that your paths have crossed.

The English poet Francis Thompson was a derelict living under a bridge until a Christian benefactor took him into his home. One of the poems Thompson later wrote was *The Hound of Heaven*, which described God as the one who sought him down through his wayward 'labyrinthine ways'. He was, like us, running from God, who all the time was leading him to an encounter with Himself.

Secondly, there is the *eureka!* factor in Andrew and John's story. This expression, from the Greek *eurisko*, is said to have been exclaimed around the year 200BC by the Greek mathematician Archimedes when he discovered a way to determine the purity of gold. Andrew used this same expression when he told his brother he had found Jesus Christ, 'I've found Him! Eureka!' (John 1:41).

This Lent, you can be sure that Jesus is certainly looking for you, and if your response has ever been, 'I've found Him! Eureka!' then you, like Andrew, have become a disciple, a Christian. Maybe you began to follow Jesus a long time ago, but your obedience has been 'on hold' – you haven't been faithful in worship, in reading the Bible. You haven't even been a part of a local church.

Lent 2025 is an ideal time to re-discover the joy of *eureka!* again.

# On the perils of parking near church...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

I cannot be wholly sympathetic because your church car park is now inadequate, only having space for 100 cars. Your solution of advising members of the congregation to park in the adjoining supermarket car park may not have been wise. The maximum time people can stop there is 90 minutes and, as your services often reach that length, returning to find their cars clamped may not make you universally popular – although it may give your congregation the opportunity of practising Christian forgiveness.

Since the medieval architect who built St James the Least of All was not overly concerned with car parking, the only space we have is along the road by the church. Inevitably, it gets blocked, which causes us all immense satisfaction when those not attending church but intending to have a morning shopping, find themselves unable to get out of the village until Mattins is over.

For most, the inconvenience of parking only makes attending church more of a pleasurable challenge; we so enjoy having something to complain about. Major Hastings, however, who has complained endlessly about parking problems, made a point last Christmas by leaving his car in the middle of the vicarage lawn. I was so pleased he happened to park just where I had had a garden pond filled in only the previous week. He returned to find that the car had sunk up to the windscreen and needed a crane to remove it.

For weddings, a farmer allows us to use the field adjoining the church. While he rarely attends church on Sundays, he is always there the week before – I suspect praying for heavy rain, so he can make a fortune charging to tow out with his tractor those who have got stuck. Perhaps the greatest act of witness your church could perform would be to get everyone attending church to park on the ring road, thereby bringing the entire town to a halt until your Sunday morning Service is over.

# Harvington First School News

The children have been very busy with lots of extra-curricular activities. After the drainage work on our school grounds last year, we are very glad to have all our outdoor space back. The staff having been making the most of the space by taking lessons outdoors: finding artefacts around the grounds in history, maths hunts, making obstacle courses and lots of science learning. The children have enjoyed a number of school trips throughout the first half of the Spring term, many with a history theme. Year 2 went to the Black Country Museum to find out about life in Victorian times and experienced what it was like be in a Victorian classroom – they are not keen for us to adopt this within our school! Year 3 had a trip to Bishops Wood to learn about the Celts while Year 5 went to the Almonry in Evesham to discover more about the Battle of Evesham. In RE, Year 4 have been finding out about Judaism and visited a synagogue in Birmingham – they really enjoyed taking the learning out of the classroom and being able see first hand what they had been learning about.

In September we introduced a new behaviour reward system linked to our school values. The children can earn points for forgiveness, perseverance, trust, friendship, respect and truthfulness. Each multiple of 25 points is worth a different reward and the children love collecting them. The rewards include a postcard home, certificate, piece of stationery, drinks and biscuits and a non-uniform pass. The favourite reward seems to be drinks and biscuits!

Our focus value for first half of the Spring term has been *forgiveness*. Everyone makes mistakes – it's part of being human. Sometimes mistakes hurt others and we need to say sorry. Sometimes mistakes made by other people hurt us. When this happens we need to be able to forgive. We looked at how God's love is so great that forgiveness is always possible.

We are looking forward to learning about Easter during the rest of this term and preparing for our Easter service.

# Church Lench First School News

Take a look at our learning at Church Lench!

Class 1: So far this term Class 1 have enjoyed learning about sailors who travelled the world and the pirates who tried to steal from them. They learnt about famous pirates like Blackbeard and how pirates would attack unwitting victims. They very much enjoyed their English text about a naughty pirate who didn't listen to the warnings of his crew and who a sticky end!! During PE sessions the children have loved learning to play hockey and practising their dribbling skills as well as playing fun team games.

Class 2: Class 2 have been very busy learning about Italy and where it is located in Europe, and used atlases to locate mountains, rivers and seas. They learnt about different map symbols and created their own maps. In Science Class 2 have been finding out about different kinds of forces and how magnets exert a force to attract and repel each other. During design technology lessons, the children planned and made 'moving monsters' using simple levers and linkages. They are also loving their class book *Oliver and the Seawigs* by Phillip Reeve.

Class 3: Class 3 have been learning about different maps, including ordinance survey maps, and finding landmarks in the local area using 4-and 6-figure grid references. They enjoyed reading *Sherlock Holmes: The Red-Headed League* by Arthur Conan Doyle and creating interesting conversations about a mystery hat, focusing on speech marks and creative vocabulary. The children are very excited to be learning about the human body, in particular the digestive system and teeth. They will be conducting some interesting experiments including how sugar affects enamel and the importance of healthy eating and drinking

Christian value *Courage*: We have listened to many stories from the Old and New Testament focusing on courage and have learnt about courageous women in history who risked their own lives to save others. Corrie Ten Boom showed tremendous courage in protecting Jewish people from being captured by Nazis during WW2. Her family enabled Jewish people to hide in a wall in their home but risked their own lives at the same time. On 27<sup>th</sup> January, we commemorated the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz and thought and prayed for all the courageous families who died during the holocaust.
