Remember, remember

My wife, aiming in my general direction, often uses the expression 'Don't you remember?' I forget.

Part of education is remembering. We don't tell our children, nursing their burned fingers, that when they were born we told them not to go near the fire and they should have remembered. We remind them before they burn. Every time. Because they forget.

November is Remembrance season, starting with the dead on All Saints' and All Souls' Days, followed by gunpowder, treason and plot and then the various acts of remembrance around war memorials. Why? Have we forgotten?

I once went to a fantastic (and very boozy) celebration of Trafalgar Day as the guest of the Chaplain at HMS Raleigh whom I was visiting. A few years later the 200th anniversary was celebrated. When, I wondered, do you stop celebrating? It's 220 next year. Isn't that enough remembering?

In my Christian tradition the regular celebration of Holy Communion (some call it the Eucharist or Mass) is a reminder of the death of Jesus. Bread is broken, wine is poured and both are shared in remembrance of him. Even though most Christians haven't forgotten.

You see remembering is one thing, remembrance is another. It's recall with gratitude. Thank you saints. Thank you martyrs. Thank you democracy. Thank you war-dead. Thank you Jesus.

We go through our seasons, traditions, events and festivals marking the passage of time and giving thanks for the big events that gave us that time.

I occasionally remind my wife that 'you teach' does not necessarily mean 'I learn'. This sort of behaviour is not a good thing for our relationship but sometimes I don't remember not to do it. I think this is where I came in.



War and peace

John Lennon wrote, *'Imagine there's no countries, It isn't hard to do, Nothing to kill or die for, And no religion too. Imagine all the people living life in peace.'* But on Remembrance Sunday, we should reflect on war past and present, and consider the real way to peace.

The way of war: 'What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? You desire but do not have, so you kill' (James 4:1-2). James reminds us that war has its basis in our own hearts, with the selfish desires that exploit, bully and kill others to get our own way. Sadly, when nations allow these inner selfish attitudes to determine their policy the result is war. Only God can establish true peace.

The way of peace: 2,700 years before John Lennon, Isaiah also imagined a **future of peace without any war**, '*They will beat their swords into ploughshares* and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore' (Isaiah 2:4).

Only Jesus, the Prince of Peace, can bring true peace to our lives and world. Jesus did not experience the horror of battle, but He did die an horrific death at **the hand of the Romans. He gave His life sacrificially, as He took God's anger** at our sin on Himself and went on to conquer death in His resurrection. He did this out of love for us, and calls us to love others in the same way, '*Greater love* has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends' (John 15:13).

How can we demonstrate such love ourselves? We can be confident in God's plan to bring an end to all wars when Jesus returns.

Children's kitchen terms

Gospel of Matthew: what's the big idea?

Continuing the series introducing the books of the Bible...

This month we turn to the New Testament and look at Matthew, the first of the gospels. Although linked to Matthew the apostle, it is generally believed the author used oral tradition, written fragments and eye-witness accounts as well as common material in the other synoptic gospels (Mark and Luke).

Matthew, in writing for Jews, sets out to prove that Jesus is the true Messiah. He connects Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection with the Old Testament Scriptures. In fact, he quotes the Old Testament more than any other New Testament author. This is reflected in the opening genealogy which traces Jesus back to Abraham; in his use of the terms 'kingdom of heaven' and 'Father in heaven', reflecting a Jewish reluctance to use God's name; and in the way he portrays Jesus as the Son of David.

The whole gospel is structured around five blocks of teaching (chapters 5-7; 10; 13; 18; 24-25). This five-fold division reflects the structure of the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Old Testament).

Matthew provides a comprehensive context by which we see all God's creation and salvation completed in Jesus, and all parts of our lives (work, family, friends and future) completed in Him. At the end of his gospel, Matthew records Jesus' commission to His disciples to share this good news and His promise to be with them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age' (Matthew 28:18-20).

Bible stories that didn't quite work

Jesus enunciated the Golden Rule which says to do one to others before they do one to you.

It was a miracle when Jesus rose from the dead and managed to get the tombstone off the entrance.

Grief – don't bottle it up

'I grieve for you, Jonathan my brother; you were very dear to me. Your love for me was wonderful, more wonderful than that of women. How the mighty have fallen!' (2 Samuel 1:26).

A lament is a passionate expression of grief, a heartfelt cry of sadness. Here David, who composed some of the most memorable and uplifting songs of praise, allows himself the opportunity to pour out his heart to God because of his deep sorrow.

Christians are sometimes confused about how to express grief. Some contemporary teaching has emphasised the power of praise, and of praising God in all circumstances, so they feel guilty about the pain inside them and do **not know how to release it. Whilst Paul does say we are not to grieve** *'like the rest of mankind'* (*1Thessalonians 4:13*), he means we should not grieve in the hysterical way that characterises those who have no hope in God. He does not mean that we should not grieve at all or that we should suppress our true feelings. That would be cruel, unnatural and unhealthy. Grief is best acknowledged and expressed, and in a way that is consistent with our belief in heaven.

David's own heart feels most keenly the loss of his dearest friend, Jonathan. Those who have known the loss of a 'soul mate' will understand the depth of his feeling and the pain in his heart. His lament enables him to get in touch with his grief, to express it, and so begin the slow process of healing and recovery.

If you are grieving today, may I encourage you to pour out your heart to God? You could pray aloud, or write your prayer down. You may find a song that helps, or a piece of music. You might talk with a trusted friend. You may just want a good cry. Whatever you do, remember that it's OK to grieve.

Harvington First School News

Last half term the children were very fortunate to experience a range of trips and learning experiences. Year 1 visited Bishops Wood to learn about the changing seasons; Year 2 visited Leicester Space Centre to enhance their topic about space; Year 3 visited Oxford Museum to find out about the Ancient Egyptians and, as part of their Europe topic, Year 4 made their own pizzas at Pizza Express! The children worked extremely hard including at home as we saw some amazing homework projects ranging from rockets and space scenes to models of European landmarks such as Tower Bridge.

This half term we are focusing on the core value of *friendship*. Friendship is a very important Christian value and one that children can relate to through their everyday experiences. It can be very difficult to navigate friendships and something we work very hard on within school. The Bible tells us that Jesus was a friend to all, regardless of who they were. He taught that God is our friend and wants us to be like Him in our friendships with others. Christians believe they can call God their friend because of the relationship made possible through Jesus. Later in the half term, the children will be learning about the story of Christmas and the impact it has on our lives today.

Our KS2 children are busy this half term running their own businesses to raise money for Children in Need. They will work together in teams to ensure their orders are created and sent out to their customers as well as keeping to a budget to make a profit. This is a great opportunity for the children to think about others and to learn a lot about finances and working to a deadline.

Soon we will begin preparing for the Christmas celebrations where Early Years and KS1 will put on a Nativity play and KS2 will hold their carol concert in the church. This year the whole school will also visit the pantomime in Worcester to see *Aladdin*. We look forward to another busy half term with lots more exciting learning opportunities.




