

The hats we wear

I don't often think about hats. It's not that I don't like them, more that they try to escape from me. They never stay on my head! I wore a fascinator to our son's wedding rather than a hat. And I was once punished at school for not wearing my school hat while waiting to go on a school trip; said hat had fallen off my head 30 seconds before the headteacher spotted me.

So, when the recent hat exhibition was announced, I was mildly interested but **not excited. However, when I saw the exhibition in St James' Church, I was blown** away. Thank you so much to everyone involved in putting this display together, greeting people and serving the refreshments.

There were over 200 hats documenting the stages of our lives. It reminded me of the quote from *As You Like It*, **Act II**, **scene VII**. '*All the world's a stage...and* one man in his time plays many parts. His acts being the seven ages.'

There, through the medium of hats, our lives were depicted – from christening **bonnets on the font; children's hats, including school hats and those of the** uniformed youth organisations; work hats including nurses and the emergency **services; bishops' mitres and wedding veils up by the altar; hats from around the** world and through the ages; military hats worn in conflict by villagers in times gone by, displayed beside the photos of those who fell in the two world wars; and finally the mourning hats that no one wants to wear, displayed on the bier.

In our lives we wear many hats and play many parts: child, sibling, parent, employee or employer, retiree and those who are grieving. Richard and I are experiencing and preparing for changes as our mothers have recently died and retirement is on the horizon. Our lives change, just like the hats we wear.

Those hats filling the church touched me in a way I hadn't expected. As Ecclesiastes says, 'there is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heaven' (Ecclesiastes 2:1).

Transition - to a new civilization?

A talk by Chris Haynes on how and why our world got to this position

Tuesday 22nd October, 7pm for 7.30pm at Harvington Village Hall

Massive climate and environmental change is now unavoidable, but quite how disruptive it will be remains in the hands of national governments. Chris Haynes, who recently completed a Masters degree in Sustainability and Adaptation, will explore how and why our society has arrived at the threshold of a challenging transition.

This transition from our existing industrial, oil-fired civilization will have to endure extreme weather, rising sea levels, collapse of our food supply and widespread human migration before we can start to use only solar power to repair and maintain a healthy planet.

Chris will explore what we, as individuals, households and a community, can do to minimise the continuing damage we are causing, to adapt to the forthcoming challenges and to survive to re-build a sustainable way of life.

An apology and a 'thank you'



Care for Creation

António Guterres, Secretary-General of the United Nations, has said that we're at 'code red for humanity: the alarm bells are deafening, and the evidence is irrefutable. Greenhouse gas emissions from fossil fuel burning and deforestation are choking our planet and putting billions of people at immediate risk.'

At this time of Creationtide, how are we to respond to these climate concerns?

The world belongs to God: 'The earth is the Lord's and everything in it' (Psalm 24:1). The world is not ours, but God's! We are called to share in care for God's world. 'Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground' (Genesis 1:28). We represent God by governing with the same self-giving generosity that we see in His creation of the earth. This challenges our consumer mindset that sees the earth's resources as both limitless and existing simply for our needs. For example, the fashion industry uses as much carbon per minute as a car emits going six times round the world! How can we make a difference in our world?

We belong to Christ: We also belong to the one whose plan is 'to be put into effect when the times reach their fulfilment – to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ' (Ephesians 1:10). We can look forward to the time when God will create a new heaven and a new earth and make everything new. Meanwhile, we are called to serve as He serves, caring for the earth and our fellow humans, by living simply, recycling, conserving energy and choosing reusable options.

In terms of our world, there is no plan B! God gave us only one planet!

Musings...

The trouble with retirement is that you never get a day off.

1 & 2 Kings: what's the big idea?

Continuing the series introducing the books of the Bible...

1 & 2 Kings is a single literary work telling the history of Israel's monarchy from the end of David's reign until the Babylonian exile following the fall of Jerusalem (586 BC). After Solomon's reign, Israel was divided into two kingdoms: Israel to the north and Judah in the south. In the north 20 rulers reigned over 210 years until the fall of Samaria (722 BC). In the southern kingdom there were also 20 rulers, spanning a period of 345 years.

This account is not like reading a modern history book. The author views the story through the lens of God's relationship with His people. The welfare of Israel depended on their leaders' trust and obedience in God (eg Solomon building the Temple) as well as listening to the prophets (eg Elijah and Elisha). The kings who receive the most attention are those whose disobedience is greatest (eg Ahab and Manasseh) or those who truly follow God (eg Hezekiah and Josiah).

The book ends with exile in Babylon, fulfilling God's warning of the consequences of disobedience for both kingdoms (*cf Deuteronomy 28:64–68*). However, this doesn't mean there is no hope for the future. At the end of the book, Jehoiachin is released from prison in Babylon and given a place of honour (*2 Kings 25:27-30*). The future remains open for God to fulfill His promises to the house of David.

'We begin to realise that if God's sovereignty is never cancelled out by the so deeply sin-flawed leaders ('kings') in both our culture and our church, we can quite cheerfully exult in God's sovereignty as it is being exercised in all the circumstantial details of the actual present.' (E Peterson).

On the perils of becoming a school governor

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

I was interested to hear that your vicar has asked you to take his place as a school governor. A whole new world of exciting meetings is about to open up to you. Naturally, you will have been told that the governors only meet three times a year. You will probably not have been told that you will also be expected to be on at least two sub-committees, where you will be immediately asked to become secretary, as a way of getting to know the job. Add on training days, **parents' evenings, sports days, school socials, end of term services, charity events** and accompanying classes on days out and you will begin to realise that your **vicar's suggestion was not as innocent as you may have thought**.

Remember, too, that all meetings require you sit on chairs designed for fiveyear-olds. You will then spend countless hours going through a 40-item agenda, trying to look dignified with your knees somewhere round your ears while drawing up school plans as if they were the Normandy landing. Harvington First School News

After a lovely summer break, it has been great to welcome back our children and families to a new school year. We have all been busy learning new class routines, particularly the children who have started in Nursery and Reception.

We had an exciting start to the term with our theme days during the first week. On our science theme day we enjoyed a visit from a planetarium with a huge explorer dome set up in the hall for the children to visit. Children in KS1 went into the dome to listen to a story introducing them to the Earth, moon and stars. They looked at different phases of the moon and discovered how to find pictures in the stars. In KS2 the children did some star spotting to discover the constellations and the stories behind them.

We also had a PE enrichment day where the children in KS1 and KS2 learnt to play futsal. Futsal is a type of football played indoors between two teams of five players. As well as getting lots of exercise the children were able to develop their team-building skills and have lots of fun!

This term we are focusing on the school value of 'truthfulness'. In worship we have been thinking about how in everyday life people can find it difficult to be truthful; sometimes telling the truth can get us into trouble. We have shared some stories to explore the importance of telling the truth: the children enjoyed reading and discussing the fable *The Boy Who Cried Wolf*.

We are looking forward to lots more exciting learning opportunities and trips throughout the rest of the term.




Come and join us!



Church Lench First School News

Welcome back

It is so lovely to welcome the children and staff back to school. The warm, friendly smiles and buzz of excitement is great to come back to after the long summer break. The children have settled in very well to their new classes and are already immersed in their learning!

We welcome two new teachers to our team this year: Mrs Morgan-Lewis who is teaching years 2/3 and Mr Enstone who is teaching years 4/5. We also welcome Miss Bullock who is our new office/finance manager.

We have an exciting curriculum planned this half term with our youngest pupils learning all about their family and where they live. Our Year 2/3 pupils will be finding out about the Tudor period including Henry VIII and his six wives. We are hoping to host a history workshop to bring the Tudor period alive in the classroom! Our Year 4 and 5 pupils are studying the Anglo-Saxon period and will be finding out where the Saxons came from and why they invaded.
